The Seven Rules for Reading a Poem

- 1. You never have really read a poem until you have read it at least twice. The first reading is a handshake; the second reading you look the poem in the eyes.
- 2. Know a little about the poem and the poet. Use the 5Ws to investigate and provide context: Who, What, Where, When, Why
- 3. If the poem has footnotes, go over them first then read the poem.
- 4. Pay attention to the punctuation. Read the poem exactly as it is punctuated. The punctuation marks serve as road signs on your journey through the poem.
- 5. Consider the title carefully.

Often times, the title is like a porthole revealing much of the poem's inner meaning and providing important context.

6. Read the poem as prose.

Think of the poem as a story the poet and the narrator are sharing with you.

7. Create a movie of the poem in your mind.

Start the movie early on; you can edit it in your mind along the way. Identify and put a clear voice to the poem's narrator.
